Progress towards regulation has taken another notable step forward with the decision to pursue UKAS accreditation. A project of this magnitude requires significant financing and the topic of fundraising features highly in this edition.

Progress towards regulation



UKAS is the National Accreditation Body for the United Kingdom. They are appointed by government, to assess and accredit organisations that provide services including certification, testing, inspection and calibration.

At a special meeting of the Council it was agreed that ABTC should make an application to UKAS for accreditation. This marks a significant step forward in the drive to establish ABTC as the animal behaviour and training sector regulator as UKAS accreditation is an important element in government recognition.

Trustees have been working hard to prepare for this moment and although it will be a lengthy and detailed process, there is a determination to succeed. Arrangements are now being made for the preliminary inspection which is expected to happen early in the new year.





BVNA Congress 2022

Taking a stand at the BVNA Congress has now become a regular feature in the ABTC Autumn calendar.

It always creates a high level of visitors to the stand, particularly this year following the launch of the BVNA/ABTC Learning Pathway in Behaviour.

There was a whole day of behaviour presentations sponsored by ABTC on the Friday. The level of interest from the delegates was high and the presentations were very well attended as usual.

Membership Categories

There are a number of different categories of membership of the ABTC.

Practitioner Organisation

Practitioner organisations are those that directly represent practitioners of animal training and behaviour therapy. Membership fee £250 annually.

Advisory Organisation

Advisory organisations are those that are animal welfare related stakeholders but do not directly represent practitioners. Membership fee £200 annually.

Individual

Individuals can only be members by invitation of the ABTC and they must have a particular skill or specialist knowledge that will benefit the work of the Council.

Supporting Organisation

Supporting organisations are similar to Advisory organisations although they have a much reduced membership fee. They may take part in discussions and consultations but they do not have any voting rights. Membership fee £75 annually.

Applications are always welcome and the necessary forms can be found on the website Individual practitioner registration fees are £15 annually.
