Review - Veterinary Surgeons Act

On the 6th May ABTC was invited to a meeting with DEFRA and other Allied Veterinary Professionals (AVPs) to discuss the shape of a potential replacement for the Veterinary Surgeons Act (1966) that could include other professions apart from veterinary surgeons and veterinary nurses.

More meetings are scheduled to consider how the possible new legislation should develop, initially based on the RCVS recommendations for modernising regulation that has already been published.



The UKAS accreditation process continues and the first stage of our application is in the process of evaluation. It has been a very lengthy and detailed process which has required significant development of policies and procedures taking many hundreds of hours work in order to bring ABTC to the level of compliance required by UKAS.

People often ask why ABTC is seeking UKAS accreditation and the answer is two-fold, firstly it provides independent confirmation that our processes are efficient and valid, assessments are accurate and we are competent to deliver our service. Secondly it was recommended by Defra as UKAS accreditation is a prerequisite to government recognition.

One thing this whole process has brought into clear focus is that it is highly unlikely the level of quality management required by UKAS is going to be matched anywhere else in the animal behaviour and training sector.

Membership Categories

There are a number of different categories of membership of the ABTC.

Practitioner Organisation

Practitioner organisations are those that directly represent practitioners of animal training and behaviour therapy. Membership fee £275 annually.

Advisory Organisation

Advisory organisations are those that are animal welfare related stakeholders but do not directly represent practitioners. Membership fee £220 annually.

Individual

Individuals can only be members by invitation of the ABTC and they must have a particular skill or specialist knowledge that will benefit the work of the Council.

Supporting Organisation

Supporting organisations are similar to Advisory organisations although they have a much reduced membership fee. They may take part in discussions and consultations but they do not have any voting rights. Membership fee £80 annually.

Applications are always welcome and the necessary forms can be found on the website Individual practitioner registration fees are £15 annually.


